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THE FINE PRINT THE FINE PRINT

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MAJESTYK Coupe

We were nine months into the COVID 19 lockdown and it was time for me to start building another airplane – mind you this is my fifth build since March 2020. Thank goodness I have this hobby to keep me interested and occupied during the pandemic.

I have always liked the Coupe d'Hiver event since I first learned about it. This event is also known known as F1G under the FAI international rules. The F1G rules are simple - an air frame that weighs a minimum of 70 grams and a rubber motor that weighs a maximum of 10 grams. That's it! The Coupe d'Hiver event originated in France around 1938. Designs for qualifying models have evolved over the years. They range from what are called "vintage" coupes to high tech multi-function coupes manufactured in Eastern Europe. Coupes typically have a wing area of approximately 160 square inches or more and a folding prop, both of which are designed to maximize the glide. A typical coupe has a prop diameter of approximately 17 inches. A coupe is underpowered compared to a P-30 but a coupe will typically out-perform a P-30, largely due to its folding prop.

I am currently building a Majestyk coupe. This is an old stick-and-tissue F1G model designed by Thom Greenhalge. The plan is dated August 1991. The same person designed the Majestyk P-30 that is still available in kit form from Retro RC. That kit was sold by Lee Campbell for many years and lots of fliers like the Majestyk P-30. The attached picture shows a Majestyk coupe built by someone else. I know this coupe won't be a high-performance model but I will enjoy flying it anyway.

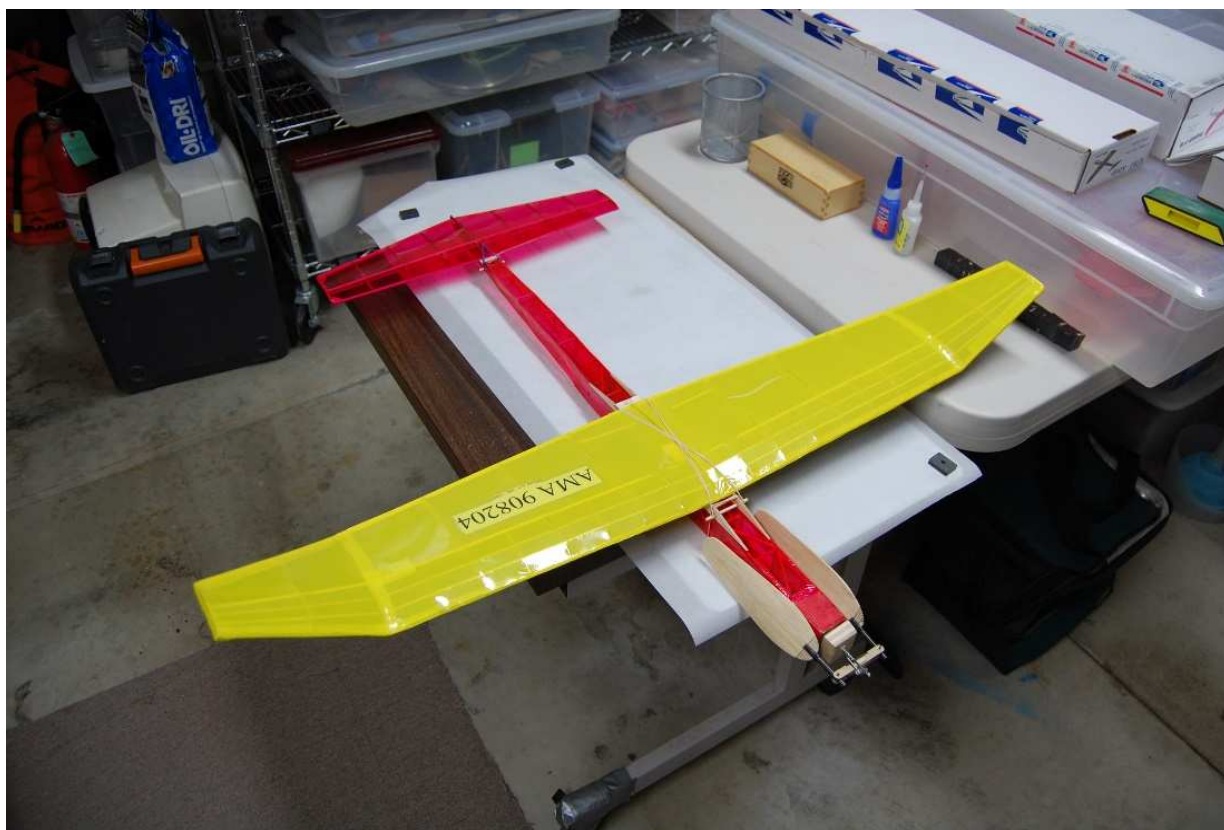

For ease of building this model, I may use an 18-inch folding prop built from a prop kit sold by Retro RC. It may be appropriate to cut this prop down to a 17-inch diameter. We shall see. I plan to cut down the height of the fin to reduce the chance of spiral instability problems. The fin looks very tall on the plan. I also plan to build the wing in two sections that can be assembled at the flying field. This will enable me to transport the model in a transparent plastic wrapping paper box that is about 31- inches long. I transport all

my models in these boxes which are sturdy, nest well, and can hold several models each. I will substitute a CF main spar for the balsa one indicated on the plan. I will cover the fuselage with Polyspan tissue, and I will cover the wing and stab with ¼ mil Mylar film. I will build a little balsa wood box that I will mount in the fuselage under the wing for removably receiving one of my Walston RF transmitters. After spending lots of time building this model, I want to maximize the chances that I can recover it after a good flight.

I want to thank Clint Brooks of the SCAMPS free flight club for supplying me with a copy of the plan for the Majestyk Coupe. He built one for the SCAMPS classic coupe event. Clint made several suggestions for modifying the plan and I think he is spot on. He also supplied me with a CAD diagram of the ribs and this is most helpful due to the tapered wing construction. In my opinion, Clint's company, CB Model Designs, sells the best free flight kits on the market. Unfortunately, I don't think he has any plans to sell a kit for a coupe. To the best of my knowledge, the only coupe kits on the market are the KIWI-KOOP sold by BMJR Models and the Souper Coupe sold by Retro RC. IMO the Majestyk Coupe should outperform both of those entry level coupes, but it will take a lot more effort to build from scratch. See the picture of the KIWI-KOOP that I built. I learned a lot building and flying this model.

Of course, there is little chance that my Majestyk coupe will fly as well as my venerable Candy G coupe that was a bargain when I purchased it as an ARF model from Starlink-Flitetech Models. Hopefully I will show you pictures of my completed Majestyk coupe sometime in the next few months. To me it is very satisfying to see a model that I built and trimmed myself get a max. Not sure what to build next, although I've still got several unfinished projects to finish up. Even so, the lure to start something new is always there.

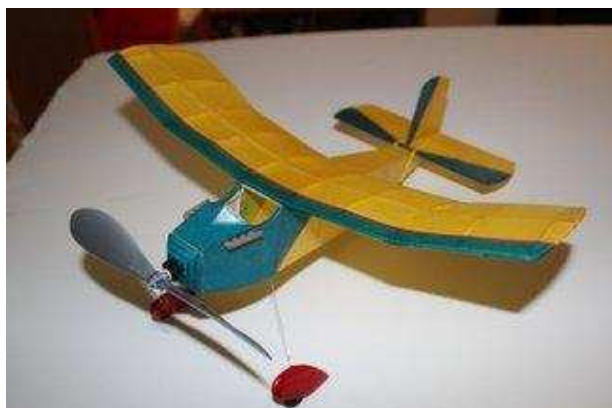
I hope you had a great Thanksgiving, and are staying healthy.

This a just-completed model for FAC Embryo events. Just under 50 sq inches, and 18 grams. It is called the Durham Mystery Plane. The mystery to me is why it is called this. Have not had a chance to start test gliding it - still looking for that patch of grass.

Okay, so I told myself I really needed to finish a few projects that have been in bare bones for quite awhile now before I start something new. I think we've all been down that road before, right?

Well, I just couldn't help it. I've had this older kit for awhile, not sure where I got it from, and it kept calling to me. She's a Kiel Kraft 'Achilles', originally designed in 1939 by Louis B. Heath, then redesigned in 1950 by Albert E. Hatfull, both of whom I believe were pretty well known British modelers.

I got started on this shortly after Thanksgiving, and as you can see, most of the bones are done. I need to form and install the landing gear, and finish the nose area, then it'll be ready to cover. I'm trying to come up with a good color scheme, but I've obviously got a few days for that.

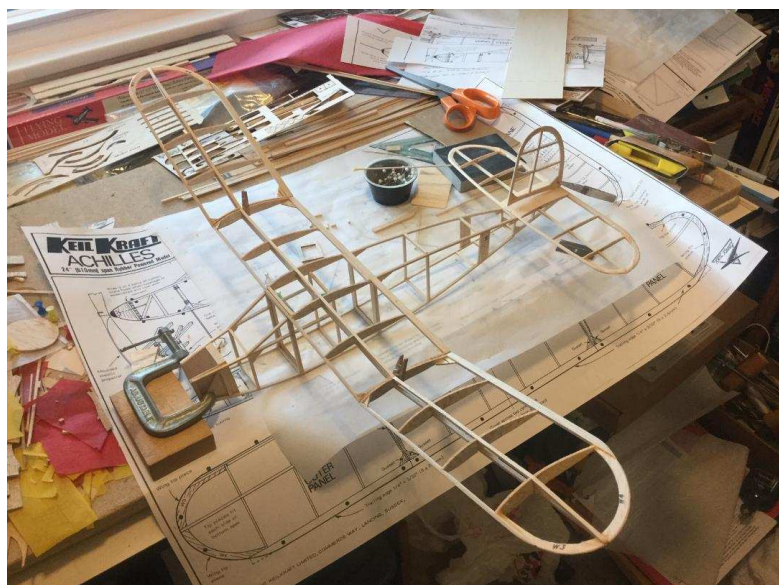
I think this should qualify for either Old Time Rubber or at least Nostalgia Rubber, but don't expect it to conquer the Gollywock types.

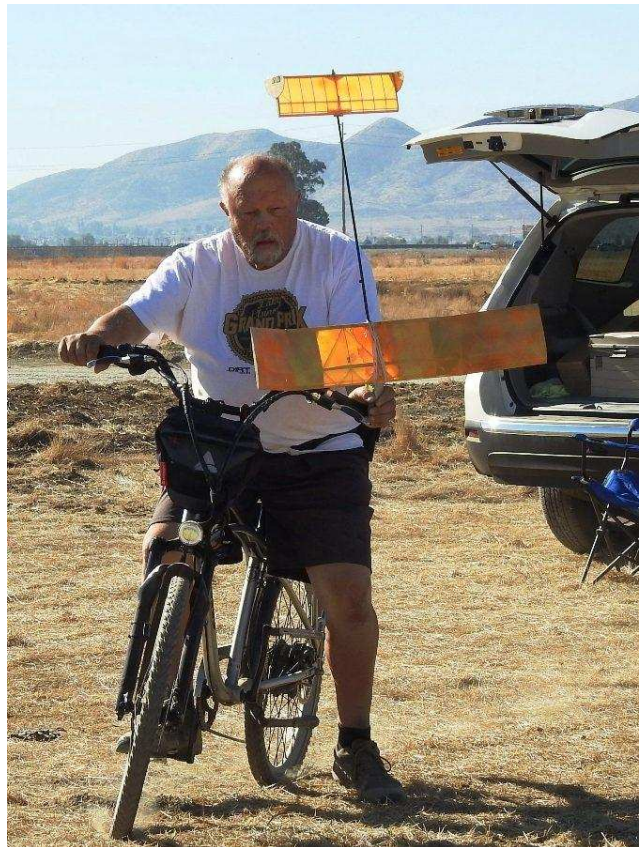

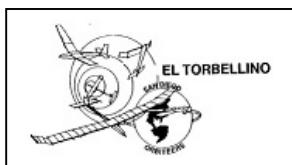

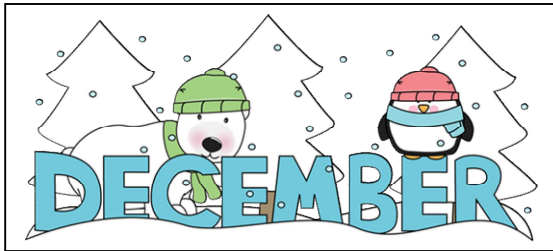
